Fiji

The priority focus is Fiji's largest reef system, the Great Sea Reef (GSR) which is the third largest continuous reef system in the Southern Hemisphere.

Papua New Guinea

The Kikori basin is one of PNG's iconic places, boasting the third largest tropical rainforest, larger than Congo and the Amazon, but one of the most unprotected. Work here aims to implement land-use management plans in four provincial government areas through a Kikori Basin 'blueprint'.

Solomon Islands

The Western Province is a high marine biodiversity hotspot in the Solomon Islands. WWF has been working with government and communities from Ghizo and surrounding islands, to develop an

effective model for co-management approaches to Marine Conservation.
